Take time to think about what you're reading. Underline things that stand out to you. I've given you plenty of room to write down thoughts, questions, or comments in the margins. This approach will help you really engage with what you're reading.

Most importantly, spend time talking about what you read with someone close to you. This could be with your Small Group, your spouse, or a friend at work. You'll get so much more out of this book if you take time to talk about it with others.

Finally, at the end of each week, you'll find some reflection questions to help apply what you've read.

This resource was designed with you in mind. My goal was to give you the best opportunity to engage with God's Word, hear God's voice, and experience God's presence.

Please know that I'm thinking about you and praying for you. I can't wait to see everything God is about to do in your life!

'KNOWN'

For many people, reading the Bible can be intimidating, because while we know it's important, it can be really difficult to understand. But if you're willing to invest a little time, I'm confident you'll be amazed at what God will show you. You're not in this alone—we're going to do it together.

As we get ready to start reading the book of Ephesians, I want to help you by preparing you for some of the major characters and concepts.

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER ONE

The book of Ephesians is a letter from a man named Paul to a group of Christians in the city of Ephesus.

Paul was the best-trained, most-passionate follower of strict, religious, Jewish Law. He persecuted the early church and followers of Jesus until he encountered Jesus Himself, radically changed, and became one of the most significant leaders of the early Christian movement.

Ephesus was a port city on the coast of modern-day Turkey and Greece with an estimated population of more than 200,000 people. It was known for the enormous Temple of Artemis, one of the seven ancient wonders of the world. The worship of pagan gods and the practice of black magic was rampant in Ephesus.

When Paul first came to Ephesus, what happened when he preached and prayed for people was so disruptive (especially to the temple worshippers and their business) there was a huge riot and Paul barely escaped with his life.

Through the process, one of the biggest and most significant churches in the ancient world emerged. Paul is a pastor who is writing to these Christians in this church to encourage them and help them continue to grow in their faith. Nearly all of chapter one is Paul's prayer for the people in the church. In this prayer, he gives a window into the incredible benefits of a genuine relationship with God.

Before we jump into each chapter, I'll give you a theme verse to help direct your reading and to prepare you for what we're going to emphasize.

I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of WSOOM and revelation so that you may know him better.

You may be wondering why we chose verse 17 as our theme verse. There are so many incredible things in this chapter, but verse 17 is a key.

Paul said he keeps asking the Father (he's continuing to do what he's already been doing) to give the people the Spirit of wisdom and revelation so we might know Him better.

Here's why this is so important: The goal is more than a better memory for spiritual information, to know about God, or to know someone who knows Him. The goal is for you to know Him.



'STRENGTHENED'

We're on the way to the second chapter...which hopefully means you finished chapter one. My prayer is that you not only completed it, but you grew in your relationship with God. You don't just know about Him...but you KNOW Him. You heard His voice and you were strengthened in your faith.

Chapter one ends with this incredible description of how God raised Jesus from the dead, placed Him in the position of highest honor above every other authority, and made Him the head of the Church.

Chapter two starts with the phrase, "As for you..." Paul is going to tell us in detail what this means for us individually before he tells us what this means for us as a group.

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER TWO

Paul is writing about all these blessings available to us in Christ-adoption, redemption, hope, faith, the Holy Spirit-from prison.

Therefore, our ability to receive these promises are not dependent on our circumstances.

.....

Verses 8-9 of chapter two motivated Martin Luther to nail 95 theses on a door, which led to the Protestant Reformation and forever changed Western Civilization.

Verses 11-22 deal with the major tension between Jews (descendants of Abraham) and Gentiles (people from any other nation). They were hostile to one another—and had been for hundreds of years. This tension existed both in the city and in the church.

In the Jewish Temple there was a physical railing that kept Gentiles away from the inner courts. Crossing the barrier was punishable by death. But verse 14 tells us that Jesus "destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility" that existed between Jews and Gentiles

These tensions were very emotional and violent in Ephesus remember they led to riots (the story is in Acts 19). These actions were the result of feeling financially threatened, overlooked, and dishonored.

Paul is going to contrast man's strategy of demanding honor, deserving God's blessing, and fighting for what's yours, with the generous grace of God. This grace makes family out of enemies.

EPHESIANS CHAPTER TWO

DAY 1

¹ As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins,

² in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient.

³ All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath.

⁴ But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy,



Ephesians 2 is one of the richest chapters in the entire Bible. So, what makes verse 6 significant?

Remember the power, the honor, and the authority God gave Jesus? Paul's making the point, when we're in Christ we receive all of those things. We don't have to fight to prove our worth and value. It's all in Christ.

And when you're strengthened with this power, you don't fight to demand it from someone else. You're free to love and serve people who are not like you.

What stood out to you from this chapter?

Read Ephesians 2:6. All of the power, honor, and authority that God has given Jesus, He has also given you. What is a current challenge you are facing, and how does this truth affect how you see that challenge?

Where do you find your value and worth? According to Ephesians 2, where should you find your value and worth?

Is there a relationship in your life causing tension right now? If so, take a moment to ask God, "How do You want me to serve this person this week?"

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'CONNECTED'

We're now moving to the third chapter of Ephesians—and I believe your confidence is growing. You learn how to read and engage with the Bible like you learn how to do anything: *someone who knows how to do it helps you!*

Chapter two ends with this miraculous picture of two groups of people who are at war with each other being unified as a family because of Jesus. That's the power of the Church—not one really unusual congregation, but the global family of God that Jesus promised to build.

This was more than a theory to Paul. He is so committed to this picture he starts chapter three with "For this reason..." He gave his life to this picture. He calls himself a prisoner of Jesus for the sake of the Gentiles.

Before he met Jesus, he despised Gentiles. Now he's willing to sit in a Gentile prison writing other Gentiles to inspire them to put their trust in Jesus and be added to the family of God, His Church, His people in the earth.

This is so crazy and unexpected that Paul repeatedly refers to it as a "mystery."

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER THREE

When Paul uses the phrase "mystery" in this chapter, he's referring to the fact that God's plan was always to include the whole world in salvation.

The answer was hiding in plain sight, right in front of him, and he couldn't see it. But it was always God's plan, all the way back to the beginning.

This may seem obvious to us, but most Jews (especially the radical ones) saw themselves as "us against the whole world."

Like most of us, the Jews took on this mentality after being tormented and mistreated. While it may have helped them, it also kept them from seeing what God was up to.

The last six verses of the chapter are a prayer Paul prays over the church.

The prayer is filled with some of the most encouraging and inspiring phrases in the whole letter, but it's also clear Paul isn't just giving information—he's casting vision for what this kind of church looks like.

Although the phrase "the church" is only used one time, this whole chapter is about the incredible power of the Church—which is open to every family in the earth. The Church is the place where all people can truly be united to God and connected to each other through the power of Jesus.



You may be thinking, "Ephesians 3:10 seems a little abstract. Why is it our theme verse?"

One person can have a relationship with Jesus. One talented person can use their gifts to honor God by serving others. But if you're going to show the full measure of God's wisdom, if you're going to express His character and His nature, you need the Church.

You need people from all ethnicities, with all kinds of gifts and personalities, united together in the name of Jesus. When they come together people can't help but say, "I feel connected to God."

What stood out to you from this chapter?

Read Ephesians 3:10. How does the Church display the manifold wisdom of God to the world?

People naturally gravitate to others who think, look, and act like themselves. (We see this occur in politics, race, economic status, etc.) What groups do you naturally identify with, and what barriers might those identities create between you and others?

God's intent for the Church is to be a place where people come together in unity. What is something you can do this week to fight for unity?

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'EQUIPPED'

God's really smart. He knows what we need. We grow when we read the Bible. We grow when we pray. We grow when we worship and listen to preaching. But when we put them all together in the context of spiritual family (the Church), the impact is exponential.

Paul tells us that people experience God's presence and His power when His Church comes together as one. That's how chapter three closes. In chapter four, he gives us some great insights into how this works.

Because the tension and the challenges in Ephesus were well-known, Paul begs and pleads with them to fight for unity. And because of the way God designed His Church to demonstrate His love for the world, every follower of Christ needs to have the same laser-focus to be united.

We need it more than ever.

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER FOUR

Paul expects each person to live in a way that pleases God. This starts with humility, patience, and bearing with one another in love—not with everyone else acting in a way that deserves our respect.

There are seven statements of "one"—when the Church prioritizes these things it produces unity.

Paul describes the different roles in church leadership and gives a clear vision into what happens when these gifts are functioning.


The chapter closes with some strong cautionary words about the attitudes and behaviors that erode and destroy unity in the Church.

The Church is not an entertainment venue. It's not designed for a few talented people to perform in front of an audience. It's God's family, His body in the earth, and it's meant to grow, move, and function in a healthy way.

When every person does their part, when every person is equipped, the Church grows in love and becomes everything God desires it to be.

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¹¹ So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, ¹² to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up ¹³ until we all reach unity in the faith...

EPHESIANS CHAPTER FOUR

DAY 1

¹ As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. ² Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love.

³ Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace.

⁴ There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called;

⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism;

¹⁶ From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

DAY 3

This book is designed to help you read, pray, and genuinely know God. When that happens, it impacts your everyday life—how you think, how you feel, how you treat others. I hope you're already seeing a difference.

But it wasn't my idea! This is God's pattern for how we grow.

Paul understands that the greatest motivation for growth is love. Make no mistake—there's a clear emphasis on character transformation in the first part of this chapter that carries over from chapter four.

People who have been adopted into God's family, who've been redeemed by the blood of Jesus, who are part of His Church, don't just sit around attending services or gaining information.

Because they understand how deeply they're loved, they change. In their normal, everyday lives they look more and more like their Father.

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER FIVE (A)

The chapter starts with one simple thought: "Follow God's example..." You're part of the family so you're expected to act like His child.

Paul lists a variety of ways the people have failed to do this including sexual immorality, greed, and obscene/vulgar talk.

There is a clear contrast between wise and foolish living that reminds us of Old Testament wisdom books like Proverbs.

Paul is concerned about spiritual apathy—a general carelessness towards the significance of prioritizing the things of God. This is a challenge for every generation.

The solution is to be filled with the Spirit. The tense of the verb in the original language communicates an ongoing filling, not a one-time event.

Over time, our character does not change because we muster up enough willpower, discipline, or habits to reinforce spiritual rules. We only change when we understand how much God loves us and how He has a better way for us to live. This happens when we make the choice to fill ourselves with His Spirit instead of our pride, our desires, or our personal comfort.

In this week's theme verse, Paul contrasts being drunk with wine with being filled with the Spirit. Wine is often used as a stimulant to enhance how people are feeling—it's used to drown sorrows or to celebrate a success. But it leads to bad choices and regretful outcomes which damage relationships.

The filling of the Spirit comforts the discouraged, provides endless joy, enhances a celebration, and always leads to a deeper connection with God and encouraging and inspiring others. This filling empowers and strengthens our relationships.

What stood out to you from this chapter?

Read Ephesians 5:18-20. What do you think it means to be filled with the Holy Spirit?

We all have personal vices—things we turn to when we're feeling stressed or sad or anxious. What are your vices, and when are you most likely to turn to them? What does verse 18 tell us we should do instead?

According to verses 19-20, how can we experience the infilling of the Holy Spirit in our lives?

'UNIFIED'

If something seems different, you're not wrong. You've probably noticed we've disrupted our pattern. For the first time, we broke up a chapter into more than one week. We have a good reason.

Every chapter of Ephesians is filled with more than enough content for one week. However, all of us grow in confidence when we feel like we're making progress, so we wanted to keep a good pace, especially in the early weeks.

But the second half of chapter five is one of the most important and brilliant passages in the whole Bible when it comes to marriage and family. If you've been to a wedding, there's a good chance it will sound familiar.

And this is a subject we know nearly everyone needs help with, so we wanted to give an entire week to this section.

Don't forget what's happened up to this point. Paul is not changing the subject from being filled with the Spirit. What our families need more than anything else is people who are filled with the Spirit—connected to God and encouraging to others.

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER FIVE (B)

The word "submit" often scares people because they view it as a license to dominate or control other people. A careful reading will show this is not what God is after.

Based on what we know about Paul from the Bible, he was not married. But he was aware and gifted to see the challenges marriage and family created and he was inspired by the Holy Spirit to help.

.....

Because of Paul's experience working with people and churches, he deeply understood the value of unity—in the church and in the home. And he knew both were only possible through the power of God.

Family unity doesn't come from a certain level of income, personality compatibility, or good genes. It's the result of an entire household of people committed to putting the wants and needs of others ahead of their own out of their love for Jesus.

Families have implied agreements: If you do this for me, I'll do this for you. This can work for a little while—until there are unmet expectations. And then it all breaks down.

Marriage and family are God's idea. When we follow His pattern, we can experience the unity He intended.



'PROTECTED'

We've made it to the last week and the last chapter of our study! My prayer is that you've gained the confidence to make reading the Bible a habit that will last beyond this guide.

The last chapter of Ephesians picks up the discussion of the household before closing the letter by using military metaphors to encourage the believers to stand strong in their faith.

Paul continues the same approach that he's been highlighting since chapter four—Christians are first called to honor and obey God, and when they do, all of their other relationships are blessed. In other words, our primary challenge is not controlling how people treat us, but confronting our own attitudes, emotions, and behaviors.

This sounds difficult because it is! But that's why we need to be filled with the Spirit, connected to life-giving relationships in the church, and rooted in the love of God. It's also why the best evidence of a man or woman filled with the Spirit is not someone so spiritual they seem disconnected from the real world, but a person with healthy, loving relationships.

INTRODUCTION TO CHAPTER SIX

In the ancient world, children were not viewed as being equal to adults. There were no child-centered homes in Ephesus. Paul's instruction for parents and children to love and honor each other may seem obvious to us, but it was countercultural.

Paul IS NOT condoning the institution of slavery. He's encouraging people in their current situation to respect and honor those they serve out of their love for Christ. The book of Philemon (also written by Paul) gives a great window into God's heart to free slaves and how people should treat each other.

What Paul is describing is closer to indentured servitude (servants had opportunity to work for their eventual freedom, i.e. Joseph) not the human chattel enslavement in America which was unequivocally wrong.

The idea that a master and servant were equals before God and He shows no favoritism was found nowhere outside of followers of Jesus. And remember, Paul is writing from prison where he always respected and honored the people holding him captive, even when it was unjust.

The Roman army was the global superpower of the day and the most fearsome military force the world had seen. Paul's audience would have imagined them when he describes the armor of a solider.

You'll notice Paul closes the letter urging the people to pray—for each other, for him, and for the advancement of the gospel. Then he sends specific greetings including his dear brother Tychicus. In other words, everything about the end of the letter is relational, not an exchange of information.

For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms.


